**UNCIVPOL Headquarters, Pleso-WEEKLY REPORT:04-09.09.95**

**I. UNCRO**

Priority mission area for UNCivpol.

**A. Change in Operational Activity:**

SE: "RSK" authorities have officially re-iterated their decision to prohibit UNCivpol operational activity. The same insensitive attitude towards human rights monitoring was seen in SS & SN immediately prior to the Croatian offensive there. "ARSK"'s Baranja CO in a written message to the Sector command on 07.05.95, pointed out in para 4 that interaction between UN members and the non-Serbian population is not acceptable. UNCivpol has therefore for some time now not been in a position to carry out any effective monitoring, as prescribed in its mandate, but is merely maintaining a continuity of presence to ease resumption of duties when the situation so permits.

SW: Proceeding as normal.

SN & SS: UNCivpol, often in tandem with the HRATs, is expanding its patrolling to the remoter villages. UNCivpol in SN is operating out of Kostajnica, Topusko, and Slunj, locations while in SS all monitors are based at Knin. Co-location with the Croatian police (Policija) cannot be implemented at present, because the Policija itself has not yet assumed a well defined structure in the newly recovered jurisdictions. UNCivpol is busy figuring out the Policija organization being set up, in terms of its various branches and their chain of command. Co-operation with the Policija to a satisfactory degree also has to be worked out. The understanding of co-operation reached with UNCivpol at the Croatian Ministry of Interior level significantly differs from that at the regional levels and even more from what is actually practiced. Co-operation from Croatian officials as envisaged by the Akashi-Sarinic agreement of 6th August is not forthcoming. Nevertheless a positive development has been the start of joint UNCivpol-Policija patrolling in the region on a regular basis.

B. Restrictions on Freedom of Movement:

SE: The same as before with one encouraging exception. Since 05.09, UNCivpol is exempted from applying in advance to use the Bilje crossing point (open 24 hrs. daily). The reason for this relaxation appears to be a cordial relationship between the UNCivpol monitors and the crossing point police rather than an overall change in attitude of the higher local authorities.

SW: UNCivpol are prevented from entering the Gredani Okucanski area by HV. No reasons have been given.

SN: More restrictions on movement are being experienced. UNCivpol patrols in the Dvor area were halted in the vicinity on two separate occasions by HV.

SS: This week, UNCivpol patrols were not allowed to proceed to the Gornji Lapac village. Policija claimed the the Gornji Lapac area, northeast of Gracac on the road to Kulen Vakuf, was not safe for UNCivpol movement. Access to Mala Polaca, denied last week, became possible again at the start of this week. Resumed patrolling of Mala Polaca, on the way from Knin to Vrlika, revealed new evidence of suspected human rights violations (see section C below).

C. Cases monitored (incl. Human Rights Violations):

SE: As noted in Section A above, UNCivpol's monitoring function has been made impossible.

SW: A relative lull in intimidation of the Serbian minority.

A serious, but dubious, complaint of intimidation/assault was recorded by Grubisno Polje UNCivpol on 08.09.. On 05.09 at around 2130 hrs. the Serbian complainant, a local male resident aged 66 years, while walking past a house was assaulted and thrown on its fence. The fence was broken, and the house's owner fired four rounds at the complainant but the latter managed to escape being hit. The next morning when the complainant was going to meet the owner of the same house, he found almost all the residents of the street gathered near the fence broken the night before. The crowd gathered started abusing the complainant. The complainant immediately left the place but he was followed by two men from the crowd, one of them called Mato, and beaten up by them. The complainant is afraid for himself and his family. He felt insecure reporting the matter to the Policija directly, choosing to come to the UNCivpol station instead. The complainant mentioned a history of being intimidated because of his ethnicity.

Another case of possible intimidation was reported on 06.09 by an elderly Serb male from Smrtic village in Okucani AOR. The Serb resident had found a bomb in one of the rooms of his house. UNCivpol asked Policija the same day to arrange for immediate removal of the bomb.

Refugees from the Banja Luka vicinity, BSA controlled territory, are settling down in the Seovica-Japag community of Pakrac AOR. UNCivpol interviewed some of the refugees who, apart from complaining of lack of humanitarian assistance and being ignored by UN and other international agencies, alleged arbitrary executions

by the BSA during the forced ethnic cleansing of the Banja Luka area. One of the refugees a 30 year old Croatian female from Debljaci village, situated 5km away from Banja Luka, described how BSA soldiers came to their village ordering an evacuation of the area. She stated that one person from her village had been killed in the process, and others in the Bosnian Muslim community who had refused to vacate their homes had also been killed by the BSA.

A criminal complaint against UN personnel was lodged with UNCivpol at 0230 hrs. on 03.09. Allegedly a 17 year old Croatian girl named Nikolina Mijoc was sexually assaulted by an ArgBAT soldier around 0145 hrs. the same night at Matoseva street in Daruvar. The girl was reportedly followed by the UN soldier after she left a local disco. UN MPs and the Croatian Policija are co-operating in the investigation of the case. The accused UNPF member was promptly arrested at 0500 hrs. a few hours after the report was made.

SN: An updated list of the proliferating number of destroyed houses is attached in annex G. It is evident that the destruction of property is continuing at a steady, if not accelerating, pace. Complaints of heinous human rights violations including murder, armed robbery, and suspected forced disappearances, of the Serbs are also continually being registered by UNCivpol.

On 02.09.95 HV conducted a weapon-searching operation in the Lovca area, west of Kostajnica. UN movement into the area was restricted during the operation, access being allowed later in the afternoon after its completion. As soon as the restriction on movement was lifted, UNCivpol patrols entered the area. Lovca village was largely deserted. A tractor loaded with looted property was encountered by the UNCivpol patrol near Borojevici. There were two men, one of them armed with an automatic rifle and dressed in HV uniform, and two women on board. The group was stopping by the abandoned Serbian houses and helping themselves to the property within. They replied to an UNCivpol query that they were robbing the Serbs in retaliation for similar actions of the Serbs against Croats in the past. A threatening motion was made with the automatic rifle at the UNCivpol monitors as a warning not to interfere. During that whole day, UNCivpol observed exceptionally high HV/Policija traffic on the road northwest from Kostajnica through Prevršac, Mecencani, and Borojevici, leading to Jabukovac and onwards to Petrinja. A road branching to the south of this Kostajnica-Jabukovac route goes to Lovca. The UNCivpol monitors on patrol were stopped and checked by a HV/Policija checkpoint at Prevršac. It may be recalled that during the defunct "RSK" control of the Sector, movement south of Jabukovac to the same area was always strictly forbidden for UNCivpol because of the typically given reason of military security.

The next day, i.e. on 03.09, UNCivpol returned to Lovca for a closer inquiry into the events of the preceding day. A local Serb female told UNCivpol of how her relative Radojka Rudanovic had been shot dead by HV soldiers in the aforesaid operation. According to the informant, on 02.09 around 1000 hrs. HV soldiers

spotted R.Rudanovic pasturing her pigs in the village surroundings. The HV soldiers ordered R.Rudanovic to stop her activity but she didn't pay attention to them. The HV soldiers then shot her dead. R.Rudanovic's dead body was left lying at the spot. Later on, the corpse was buried by the victim's neighbours and her sister-in-law in her family section of the new village cemetery. At about 1300 hrs. the same day during the operation in the lower part of the Lovca village i.e. D.Lovca, the HV soldiers robbed 200 kunas from a local Serb that had been given to him only a month ago by the Croatian local Red Cross. The Croatian law enforcement agencies should of course be legally obliged to fully investigate the above-mentioned allegations of murder and robbery. In the interest of confidence building, it is strongly urged that such operations in villages with a vulnerable Serbian minority be conducted first of all not by HV soldiers but by professional Croatian civilian police i.e. the Policija and secondly under *in situ* UN observation.

Also in Kostajnica AOR, UNCivpol received reports on 01.09 of flagrant looting from nearby villages. In Menecani village a local Serb, who does not want his identity disclosed, reported how on 29.08 a 88 year old Serbian male resident of the same village was robbed of his property by a group of three unknown persons, two of them being in HV uniforms. The accused robbers were armed with automatic rifles and came in a car bearing registration #SK-777-A6. A tractor, cultivator, and other agricultural equipment was loaded and taken away on a truck that arrived soon after them. An UNCivpol patrol on 30.08 to the villages of Stremen, Crkvenij Bok, and Ivanskiy Bok, just east of Sunja in the former ZOS were informed by a local schoolteacher of the plundering that had taken place there. The remaining Serb inhabitants, predominantly elderly citizens, in these villages were interviewed by UNCivpol to assess the extent of the looting. Abridged accounts from the locals, with their respective names mentioned, follow:- Strabac Stoja simply said that everything was taken from his house. Bizic Savo complained of his son's Audi motor-car and a color TV set being robbed by men in HV uniform. Drajin Bizic said that his entire crop-harvest had been removed by unknown persons dressed in HV uniform. Zlopaka Ljuban informed UNCivpol of how unknown persons had stolen her horse-carriage and all of her fire-wood. On 03.09 about 5km northwest of Dvor on a side-road in the direction of D.Javoranj, an UNCivpol patrol discovered a major dumping site of property belonging to the departed native Serbs. Piles of all sorts of motor-vehicles and other personal belongings were seen spread over an area approximately 200m by 300m wide.

A 76 year old Serbian woman, living in Glina, informed UNCivpol on 04.09 that her husband has disappeared since a night in the beginning of August (she can't remember exact date) coinciding with HV/Policija's invasion of the area. Her husband had stepped out that night to check the condition of their cattle but never returned. A few days later the complainant heard a car outside her house. When

she went out to see what was going on, a man in uniform appeared pointing a pistol at her. She went back inside her house frightened. Another Serbian woman Milica Stanko, resident of Zivkovic Kosa village near Vojnic, also appealed to UNCivpol for assistance in finding out the fate of her husband. On 12.08.95 her husband was taken by the Croatian military police to Vojnic for interrogation, and subsequently removed to Karlovac. Since that date, Milica Stanko has not received any news of her husband. The Croatian law-enforcement officials appear to have yet again failed to fulfill their legal responsibility, clearly defined by international humanitarian law, of providing information about the charges faced, time of taking the arrested person to custody, precise location of detention, time of appearance before a judge or similar authority, etc. to the concerned family.

UNCivpol has not established a sub-station inside the Kupljensko refugee camp but is attempting to monitor the situation there through frequent patrolling. The security situation inside the camp is still assessed as being precarious; even the Croatian law-enforcement agencies are reportedly apprehensive of taking care of it. On the afternoon of 03.09 one of the Bosnian Muslim refugees was shot and grievously wounded. No information about the identity of the assailants, as well as other details of the case, has been given to UNCivpol presumably because of the atmosphere of fear pervading the camp.

SS: The human rights situation, as in SN, is critical. Reports of murder, robbery, arson, forced disappearances, criminal intimidation etc. continue building up. The accused are more often than not men in HV or Policija uniforms. The updated list of the arson-affected villages is so lengthy it is awkward to attach it as an annex to this report. The list has however been separately forwarded to the humanitarian crisis cell in the SRSG's office, Division of Information, and ICTY.

Not only are previously noted corpses seen lying around still unattended, but additional ones are being discovered. On 06.09, an UNCivpol patrol to Zrmanja village, Gracac AOR, found a partially decomposed corpse at the roadside about 4km from Zrmanja bridge. The corpse was of a male, dressed in civilian clothes, with three bullet gunshot wounds in the stomach. A driving licence and other personal documents were recovered from the corpse, identifying the victim as 57 year old Komazec Gojko. The information and the documents were promptly passed on to the Gracac Policija duty officer. Also on 06.09, UNCivpol/HRAT came across a half buried corpse at Brezovac village near Donji Lapac. The back of the corpse, not covered by earth, revealed three gunshot wounds. The corpse, though decomposed, could be seen to be that of a male who had probably been wearing civilian clothing (a photograph was taken by the HRAT). An UNMO team, on 04.09, found the corpse of a woman in her car at Babic hamlet, 1km north of Kistanje. The woman had two gunshot wounds in her head. The UNMO team had earlier on 01.09 met the same woman alive and helped her out with her car. A partially decomposed corpse of an elderly woman, cause of death not apparent, was shown on 07.09 by a local to UNCivpol

at Vuksic village, Stankovci Policija's jurisdiction, lying abandoned in the fields about 500m off the main road. On 29.08, Mrs. Mika Crnograc was found dead on the floor of her house's corridor, by a neighbour, shortly after the former had been taken inside by three HV soldiers. The corpse has since been removed by the Croatian civil defence unit on 02.09. UNCivpol visited the scene of occurrence on 03.09 and observed what looked like a large dried bloodstain at the spot where the corpse of the victim had been.

Forced disappearances and arbitrary arrests of the native Serbs have been complained of. A local Serb of Tice hamlet in Mala Polaca village informed UNCivpol on 04.09 that 3-4 days earlier (significantly when access to the village was restricted) another Serb resident, 34 year old Tica Zeljko, of the same village was taken away by Policija without any official intimation. No information about his whereabouts or condition has been available since. Similarly on 02.09 an UNCivpol patrol to Omscica village near Gracac was informed by a Serb resident, Smilja Dukic, that her 76 year old father had been arrested by the Policija on 09.08 and removed to an unknown destination. S. Dukic had earlier complained to the Gracac Policija about the incident, but without any effect.

Armed robbery from local Serbs in the villages of Biocic, Bukovic, Miocic, Cucevo, Palanka, and Benkovac Selo has been complained of by the victims to UNCivpol this week. Except in one case, where armed men in civvies were accused, the perpetrators were always reported to have been in HV uniforms. An 80 year old Serb, living in Jagodnja Gornja village, reported on 04.09 how he is being subjected to daily doses of intimidation including an attempt by one unknown civilian to strangle him. UNCivpol eye-witnessed ongoing arson in the villages of Biskupija and Strmica on 03.09. At Strmica, two armed Policija personnel and an armed HV soldier were met at the scene of the burning house, who claimed that they had arrived after the fire's onset to investigate its cause.

D. Humanitarian role:

SE: No activity.

SW: Medical assistance, as noted in the preceding weekly report, is direly needed by the refugees from Bosnia. UNCivpol patrols to refugee locations have highlighted the urgency of supplementing the efforts of ArgBAT medical team. A substantial number of local Serbs are anxious to be transferred out to FRY. UNCivpol contacted Policija to seek clarification about the official procedure. It was learnt that the Serbs wishing to leave must first pay taxes and expenses for procuring necessary legal documents before their transfer requests can be processed.

SN & SS: The surviving Serbs remain in acute need of humanitarian assistance. Croatian Red Cross has distributed 200 kunas to some of the inhabitants as a welfare stipend.

E. Quality of life:

No marked changes observed from last week. The return of Croatian civilians to the areas comprising SN & SS is slower than expected.

F. Crimes against U.N.(and related international agencies):

Nothing to report!

II. UNPROFOR

The UNCivpol deployment in Velika Kladusa has started receiving reports of alleged human rights violations. On 01.09 a native Bosnian Muslim, a former supporter of Fikret Abdic, gave a detailed statement to UNCivpol on how he and his son were tortured by the 5th Corps and Bosnian police on 07-8.08 during illegal detention and made to sign a document against politically dissident Imams (Islamic religious authorities). Father and son were released separately on 15.09 and 23.09 respectively. Another local Bosnian Muslim, a retired police officer, also gave UNCivpol a detailed account on 01.09 of how he had been terrorized and abducted by the 5th Corps and Bosnian police in the beginning of August. The retired police officer eventually managed to escape the abductors, before they killed him according to their plans, and returned to his house on 29.08 where he has been living in secrecy since then. The abductors have been seen by the victim's family in town. The victim's wife has lodged a complaint about the abduction with the Federal Police chief Advo Panjata who claims to have identified the culprits. In the light of these testimonies, it has been decided to enhance UNCivpol human rights monitoring in the Velika Kladusa area.

For an idea of the human rights situation reportedly existing in the BSA controlled part of UNPROFOR's AOR, refer to the feedback given by Bosnian refugees now at Western Slavonia (described in Section C/UNCRO).

III. UNPREDEP

Routine activity of the border police monitored. No alarming smuggling or illegal border crossings seen.

Patrolling to ethnically sensitive villages noticed no signs of disturbance to law and order.



OVERALL ASSESSMENT/CONCLUSION:

The overall human rights situation in the Theatre and its prospects are assessed as in the last two weekly reports.

The Croatian government has still not convincingly tried to remedy the situation in spite of the UN's high profile human rights monitoring. Evidence of the alleged crimes against the Serbian minority are fast disappearing. Corpses are being eaten by animals or randomly buried. It will soon be difficult to distinguish houses destroyed in the Croatian offensive from those destroyed by the Serbian side in '91. In short, the goal of restoring confidence of the minority Serbs in the Croatian government is becoming an exceedingly uphill task.

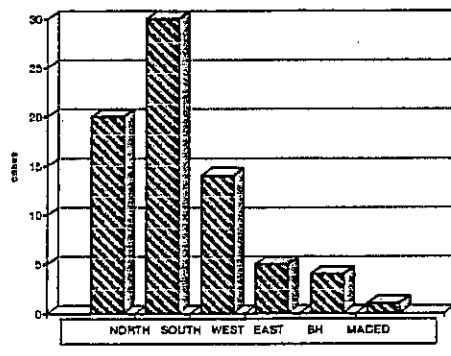
Note on attached statistical data:-The flow of complaints by local Serbs from the Krajina and Western Slavonian regions of Croatia has been depicted graphically in annexes E & F respectively. It is important to realize that temporal variations in the number of complaints recorded are not only a reflection of the extent of victimization but also of fluctuations in our ability of monitoring. Nevertheless qualitative trends can be discerned.

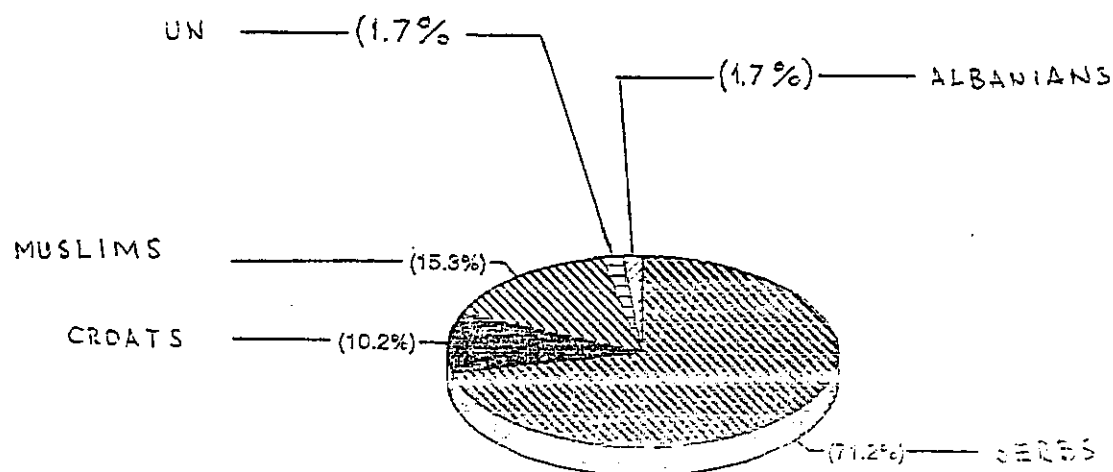

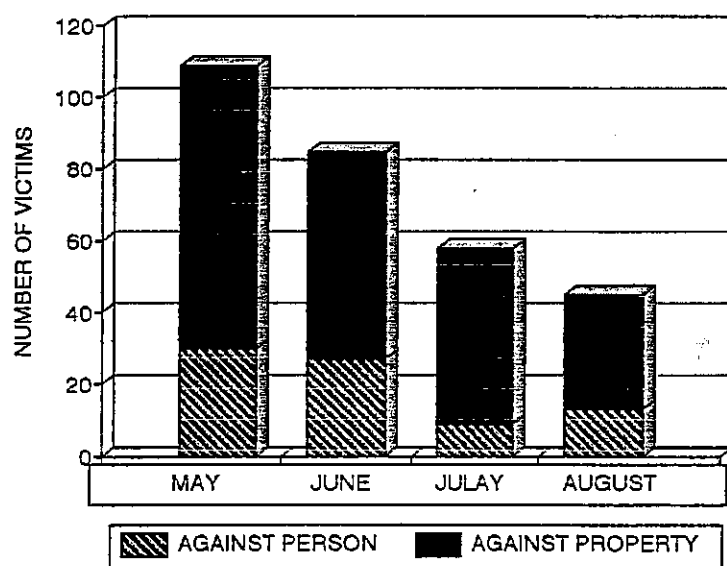
## RECORDED PER WEEK IN SECTOR NORTH AND SOUTH

## RECORDED PER MONTH IN SECTOR WEST

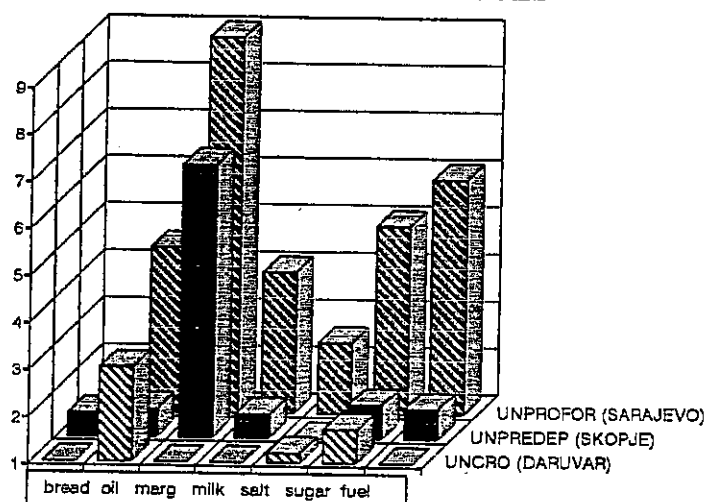
